
1. Use an online dictionary to find the word '**ethereal**'. Can you write a definition for it in your own words?










Ingredients

- 1 tsp bicarbonate of soda
- 2 tsp ground ginger
- 1 tsp ground cinnamon
- 125g/4½oz butter
- 175g/6oz light soft brown sugar
- 1 free-range egg
- 4 tbsp golden syrup

To decorate

- writing icing (optional)
- cake decorations (optional)


