30 minutes  Daily Reading	<p>We will read this text on Thursday and Friday. <u>Robert Burns</u></p> <p><u>Who is He?</u> Robert Burns is one of Scotland's most famous poets and song writers. He is widely regarded as the National Poet of Scotland. He was born in Ayrshire on the 25th January, 1759. Burns was from a large family. He had six other brothers and sisters. He was also known as Rabbie Burns or the Ploughman Poet.</p> <p><u>Childhood</u> His father was a farmer. As a child, Burns had to work very long hours on the farm to help out. This meant that he didn't spend much time at school. Even though his family were poor, his father made sure that Burns had a good education.</p> <p>As a young man, Burns enjoyed reading poetry and listening to music. He also enjoyed listening to his mother sing old Scottish songs to him. He soon discovered that he had a talent for writing and wrote his first song at the age of fifteen. It was called Handsome Nell.</p> <p><u>Becoming Famous</u> In 1786, he planned to emigrate to Jamaica. His plans were changed when a collection of his songs and poems were published. The first edition of his poetry was known as the Kilmarnock edition. They were a huge hit and sold out within a month. Burns suddenly became very popular and famous.</p>

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	<p>That same year, Burns moved to Edinburgh, the capital city of Scotland. He was made very welcome by the wealthy and powerful people who lived there. He enjoyed going to parties and living the life of a celebrity.</p> <p><u>The Agate Stone</u></p> <p>Burns enjoyed travelling around Scotland. He liked to collect old songs and poems. He would often change and improve them. Whilst on a tour of the Scottish Highlands one day, Burns found a beautiful agate stone pebble. Agate is a colourful, patterned gemstone. On his return to Edinburgh, he had it made into a cravat pin. Cravats were like a tie, worn by men at that time. This showed how wealthy and successful he had become.</p> <p><u>His Death</u></p> <p>In 1788, Burns moved from Edinburgh to Dumfries. Although he was still young, his health was beginning to suffer. This might have been due to the long, hard work he did on the farm as a boy.</p> <p>Robert Burns died on the 21st July, 1796. He was only 37 years old. His wife, Jean Armour, was unable to attend her husband's funeral as she was giving birth to Maxwell Burns, their youngest son.</p> <p><u>Remembering Burns</u></p> <p>Robert Burns became even more famous after his death. Statues of Burns can be found in many countries around the world, such as America, Canada and Australia.</p> <p>The 25th January (Burns's birthday) is now celebrated as Burns Night. Burns Night Suppers are held by people who enjoy his work. The evening is spent listening to his poetry and songs. Traditional Scottish food like haggis, neeps and tatties are eaten. The adults drink a dram of Scottish whiskey whilst listening to bagpipe music.</p> <p><u>Famous Songs and Poems</u></p> <p>Burns was famous for writing from the heart. His work appealed to all, from the common person to the wealthy. Even though he wrote in a Scottish dialect, his work was loved by people from around the world. He was influenced greatly by the French Revolution which began in 1789, where the people of France rebelled against the monarchy of Louis XVI. He thought that rich and poor people should be treated equally.</p> <p>One of Burns's most famous poems is called Tam o'Shanter. It is also a favourite of Burns himself. The poem is a ghost story set in Scotland. It tells the tale of Tam and his eventful journey home one night.</p> <p>Burns is well remembered for his reworking of an old Scottish song called Auld Lang Syne. The song is about days gone by and the people we have had to say goodbye to. It is traditional to hold hands with the people next to you as you sing. This is to remind us about the importance of friendship. As the clock strikes midnight on New Year's Eve, Auld Lang Syne is sung to celebrate the end of one year and the start of the next.</p>



If Denis started at the ground floor and went up in order to the floors he had parcels for he would go to floors 1, 2, 4, 5 and 6, stopping or passing 6 floors. If he then went down to basement floor -5 he would travel past 11 floors. If he then delivered to floors -4, -3, -2, -1, and finished back on the ground floor he would have visited another 5 floors.

$6+11+5= 22$ floors.
